

HOW TO BUY AND SELL BONDS



INTRODUCTION

It is obvious that many people do question: what exactly is a bond market? How is it an investment vehicle? And how literally can they participate in it?

The bond market can be complex for individual investors to understand. This Plain Talk guide explains clearly how bonds work, how to invest in the bond market and how bonds can play their part in a diversified portfolio to meet one's financial goals.

WHAT IS GFIM?

GFIM is a market that facilitates the secondary trading of all fixed income securities and other securities to be determined from time to time.

The market was established by key stakeholders in the financial market led by the Bank of Ghana (BoG), Ghana Stock Exchange, (GSE), Central Securities Depository Ghana Ltd (CSD), Ghana Association of Bankers, the Ministry of Finance, Financial Market Association (ACI Ghana) and Licensed Dealing Members (LDMs) of the Ghana Stock Exchange. GFIM is the premier bond market in Ghana.

WHAT IS A BOND MARKET?

The Bond market is where investors go to buy and sell debt securities issued by corporations or governments. The bond market is also known as the debt market. Securities sold and bought on the bond market are all various forms of debt.

WHAT ARE BONDS?

Bonds sometimes referred to as debt securities are an obligation by one party to make payment(s) to another party in the future. These securities take various forms. However, in general, they have a fixed maturity date on which the debt must be repaid, and they pay some form of interest. The level of interest paid may be either fixed or variable, although long-term debt tends to have a fixed rate of interest.

Think of buying a bond as loan given from an investor to a borrower such as a company or government. The borrower uses the money to fund its operations, and the investor receives interest on the investment and the principal at maturity. The time frame of the interest payment on bonds is fixed (part of the description of a particular bond) hence bonds are called fixed income.

BOND ISSUERS

Government: In Ghana the government raises money from the public to help pay for major government projects and to pay down its debts. This kind of debt issued by national governments are often considered low-risk investments since issuing is backed by the government.

Corporate: Public companies issue bonds to fund expansion and other major projects, typically offering higher interest rates. These are considered higher-risk investments.



HOW DO BONDS WORK?

You can hold a bond until maturity or trade it on the secondary bond market. Bonds are continually traded, and their capital value changes in line with interest rate movements and other economic factors. Traders of the bonds are large banks, brokers, and broker-dealer institutions. These traders buy and sell bonds to profit from price fluctuations or generate coupon income. It's important to know that bonds have both a face value and a capital value.

The face value is the amount you will receive back from the issuer when the bond matures at the end of a set term. Most bonds make regular coupon (or interest) payments over the term of the bond.

The capital value is what the bond is worth when it is bought and sold on the market. While the face value is fixed, the capital value can vary during the term, depending on factors such as interest rates and economic conditions.

HOW DOES ONE BUY OR SELL BONDS ON THE GFIM?

Securities are bought and sold on GFIM only through Banks, Licensed Dealing Members also known as Brokers and Broker-Dealers. A Dealing Member is a company which buys and sells securities on behalf of investors for a fee or commission. As part of the services rendered by banks, the banks also buy and sell securities on behalf of investors for a fee or commission or spread.

An investor cannot personally come to GFIM to buy securities but can buy them through the Brokers or banks. Securities Dealers, apart from buying and selling securities on behalf of clients, also offer investment advice.

To buy Bonds, an investor must first contact a GFIM Member to open a depository account. This is similar to opening an account with your bank. The account you open will be credited with the bonds you buy as well as debited with the bonds you sell. Subsequently, periodic statements from the Central Securities Depository (Gh) Ltd sent to you will show the number and amount of bonds you hold.

Once the depository account is opened, the investor must decide on the kind of bonds that are of interest to him. The member can also recommend the bonds which are suitable for an investor's needs when the member is given the option to make recommendations. After deciding on the bond, the broker buys the bonds at the favorable price at the time of trading on the automated trading system on the trading floor of the GSE, in his office or through the internet.

Once the broker buys the bonds on the market, he sends to the buyer a Contract Note showing the date of the transaction, the number of bonds bought, the price, and commissions or fees chargeable and the total amount involved.

The procedure for selling bonds is like that of buying bonds.

WHAT AFFECTS BOND PRICES?

There are several factors that can affect bond prices, some of these include:

Economic and market conditions: The bond market tends to provide benefit from volatile markets as investors look to reduce their exposure to securities.

Time to maturity: Bonds with more time to maturity are more sensitive to changes in interest rates.

Credit quality: Bond prices can be affected by changes in the issuer's credit risk.

HOW IS BOND RISK MEASURED?

Bond credit ratings are important because they indicate the likelihood that an issuer will fail to pay the interest and the principal back. Bonds with lower credit ratings tend to come with higher interest rates to compensate investors for the increased risk they are taking.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF INVESTING IN BONDS?

Bonds can play an important role as a counterweight to riskier assets like shares and property by:

Generating regular income: Income in the form of interest (coupon) payments can deliver a reliable stream of income for a broad portfolio of bonds.

Help in reducing volatility: If you hold a bond until the end of its term, you know exactly how much you'll receive back at maturity (the face value) and how much you'll receive along the way (coupon payments). If you buy or sell bonds before maturity, you are exposed to more volatility as the capital value can fluctuate along with interest rates and market conditions.

Diversifying your portfolio: Investing in a broad range of bonds can help diversify your returns. Bond returns tend to be positive when share returns have been negative. This inverse relationship between bonds and shares can provide balance to your investment portfolio.
